At present, councillors are happy to receive the informational emails sent by the clerk. May be reviewed in the future.

Speeding in village and on Caistor High Street.

Cllr. Dyas reported back that he had held discussions with Lincs SpeedWatch, as he had received no response from the police to ascertain ways in which speed restrictions could be introduced within the village boundary. SpeedWatch confirmed that Benniworth does not fulfil the criteria for a 30 mph speed limit. They did offer speed gun. It was also suggested that there be "beware Pedestrians and Horses" signs at either end of the village mounted on gates at the side of the road which may have some effect, and also address the issue of speeding cyclists.

Update on defibrillators.

This item to be carried over to the next meeting as the person maintaining them is on holiday. Cllr Stewart agreed to check with Glebe Farm that the new defibrillator there has been registered.

has been established in Horncastle since 2019 and our home is a unit on the industrial estate on Boston Road. Nearly all of our equipment comes from donations from local families and we are run by volunteer helpers who give freely of their time to help the community.

We work entirely via referrals from health care

professionals who are supporting families in need. Our health care workers can be: social workers, GPs, midwives, schools and children's centres (in fact just about anyone working to support families in need) and we aim to provide all types of baby equipment - including: cots, prams, clothes, toys and games and nearly anything else you can think of! We supply equipment for children from birth to 5 years old - although if required we will try to obtain items for older children if we can.

In order to access our service, all we need from you is an email, message via Facebook or Whatsapp telling us what the family you are supporting needs, and we will try to find it and will arrange a time for you to come and collect it to pass on to the family. Requests can be small or large – from a few toys and books, up to a cot, pram, highchair plus clothes for a new baby.

The Bible? The New Testament? Church? Are these relevant to me?

Another question that I asked myself many years ago, before I was a regular attender at church, before I had any faith. It is still a good question and one worthy of an answer.

Discerning the relevance of the message of the Christian church, more specifically the Bible's New Testament, in today's world can feel a bit like being a detective in a historical drama, minus the deerstalker hat and magnifying glass. Firstly, consider the context: the New Testament was written in a time of sandals and parchments, not smartphones and Cloud storage. Yet, its themes of love, sacrifice, and redemption are timeless, echoing through the ages like the world's longest-running soap opera.

One can look at the New Testament not just as a collection of ancient texts, but as a dynamic blueprint for living. It's about finding the universal truths nestled within parables and stories that transcend the first-century Middle East and feel just as at home in a 21st-century coffee shop.

The key is to engage with the subject critically and reflectively, asking not just "What does this say?" but "What does this mean for me, for us, in the here and now?"

In essence, discerning the relevance of the New Testament is an exercise in translation, not from Greek to English, but from ancient wisdom to modern life. It's a journey of 2,000 years, give or take, and the destination is understanding how these old stories spark new insights in the human heart.

While there are many different types of Christian church, most of them will have someone who can answer your questions. And if you're not quite ready to go to a church, there is a great (free) course called the Alpha Course which is run for people with no or little experience of the Christian faith, or those who want a fresh view. It's a place where you can ask all of those 'silly questions' (which I can guarantee will not be silly at all) that you've never been given answers for. The courses take place all over the country, and some run online too. Find out more here: https://alpha.org.uk/try


